We are calling on our leaders to prioritize the development of a robust and effective drainage system that can prevent future disasters like the ones we are currently witnessing in Benue. As you go through this magazine you will see that our children have been so traumatized by these flooding experiences that they are writing about it in school. It is time for our government to invest in long-term solutions that will protect our communities and ensure the safety and security of all residents. In the meantime, we offer our thoughts and prayers to all the members of our learning community and all those who were affected by the recent flooding. May you find strength and resilience in the face of this hardship! It is our prayer that one day we will have a government in place that will understand the priority of this problem and take decisive action to address it. We love you all and wish each and every one of you a wonderful and safe long holiday!

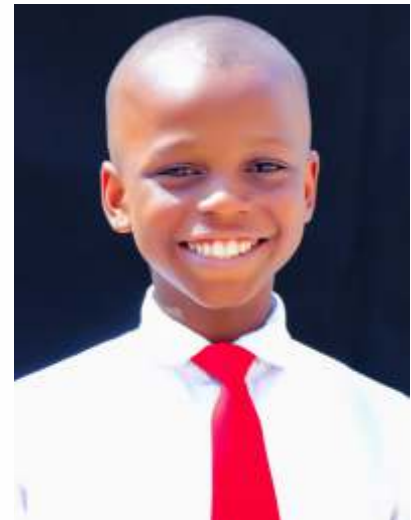
Our Cultural Day Celebration

COOKING MY FAVORITE LOCAL DISHES

During the last cultural day I got a chance to taste a variety of local dishes that some of my mates brought and they were truly delicious. I became curious about how the different dishes are made. So I decided that I was going to learn how to cook the different local dishes so that we can eat different kinds of food at home. When the teachers started serving the food I quietly sat at a corner watching the different dishes and writing down their names. Some of the dishes included gbordi (dry okro), Atuur (fresh okro), Nune u ndoor (fresh locust beans soup), Gyandi (sliced dry okro soup), mbue (dry pawpaw strips soup) and so on. I made up my mind that after the cultural day, I was goin to learn how to cook each of these soups. I



especially enjoy the fresh locust beans when served with luam kumen (pounded yam) or hot luam nahana (flour meal). My love for this soup gave me the courage to draw close to one of the elderly women present at the occasion to ask her if she knows how to mke fresh locust beans, “Of course I do!” she stated confidently. “I really like fresh locust beans and would like to learn how to make it, can you guide me?” “Sure!” She answered. Here are the steps:

Step 1: First get your fresh locust beans, when buying avoid the one that is over fermented and soft. Then get dry fish, dry pepper, some salt, seasoning cubes, a spoon of palm oil, onions and some water (depending on the quantity you want to prepare.

Step 2: wash your hands properly, grind all your ingredients as listed on step 1 on the grinding stone.

Step 3: Get clean pot, add a little quantity of water, a spoon of palm oil, a pinch of salt, all the grinded ingredients and you're seasoning.

Step 4: Cook it until the ingredients boil then, add in

your dry fish and allow it to boil till soft. After that add your fresh locust beans and bring it down from the fire. Your fresh locust beans soup is ready to be served with either pounded yam or flour meal.

How Cultural Day *was this* year!

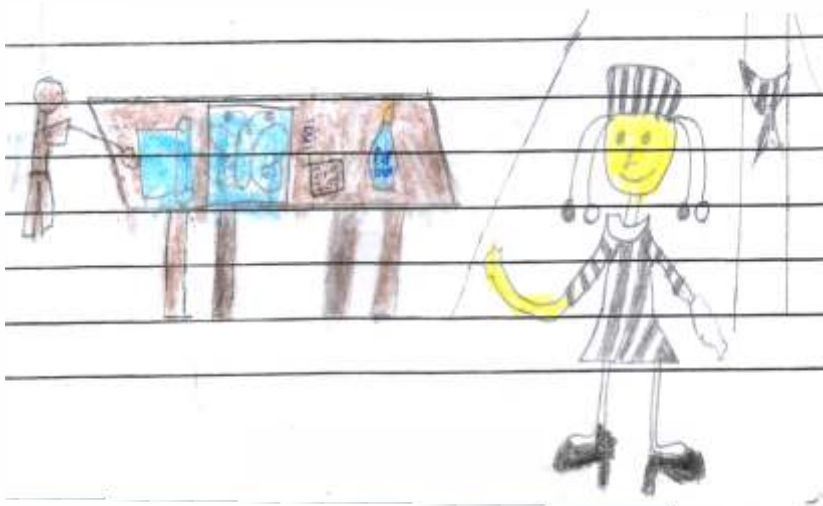

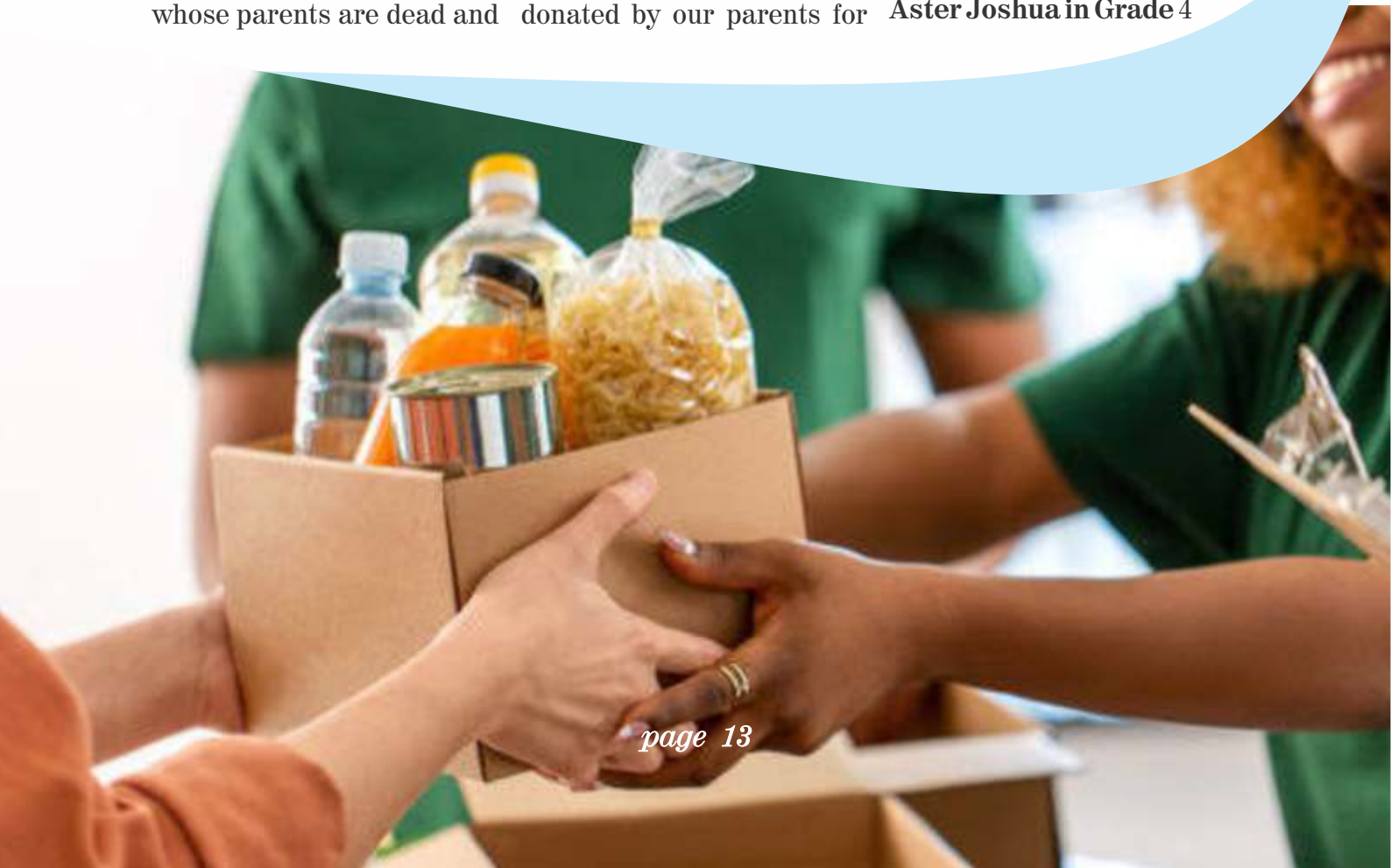
Giving is the Act of Exchanging Something of Value With One Another

Dajoh Pottery specializes in making ceramic pots, and other ceramic utensils. On the day of the fieldtrip, our school bus was set and ready to leave at exactly 8:00am. Step 3: Dry the clay for 3-4

days.

Step 4: Then take the clay to the loom and put it into a polyethene bag

Step 5: When you are ready to start molding it, make sure you weigh it on a weighing scale to know exactly how much of it you are using.

Step 6: Once you have finished molding it into the shape you want, put it on fire at 800-degree Fahrenheit then remove it and dip it in grease before colouring it. Do you know we were given some clay to make objects? The potters prepared some clay and gave it to the school management as well as assign us a task to mold any vessel or object of our choice. 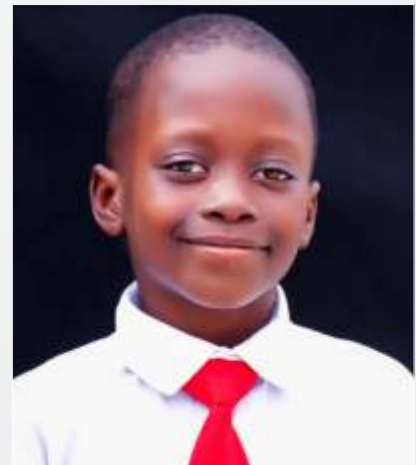
